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ANNALS OF THE UNIVERSITY

1862

An act donating public lands, on the ratio of 30,000 acres for each Senator and Representative, to the states and territories which would provide colleges for the benefit of Agriculture and the Mechanic Arts was passed by Congress, and approved on July 2, 1862. Under this grant Illinois would receive property to the value of \$600,000.00 (480,000 acres) the interest on which was to be applied for these purposes. The grant must be accepted and applied to its uses before July, 1867, or it would revert to the government.

1863

The Legislature of Illinois accepted the grant Feb. 14, 1863, and discussed the matter for some time without being able to come to any agreement on the details of the proposed college or on its location. Some wished to divide the money up among the existing colleges, provided they establish schools of this nature: some to establish a school to teach Agriculture and the Mechanic Arts; and some to attach a new school to the Normal University.

1864

At the State Fair held in Decatur in 1864, a committee was appointed by the State Agricultural Society to take the matter up and present some definite plan to the Legislature. This Committee was composed of Wm. H. Van Epps, Prof. J. B. Turner, A. B. McConnell, B. G. Roots, and John P. Reynolds. They drew up a bill as an expression of the views of the farmers, and presented it to the Legislature in 1865, and again in 1867.

1866

State meeting of all those interested in the organization of the proposed Industrial University held at Bloomington. Meeting recommended that the state build only one university.

Sept. 21—Notice was published of an informal election to be held in Champaign county on Oct. 10, by order of the board of Supervisors. The voters were to decide whether or not the county should appropriate \$100,000.00 worth of Champaign county bonds "to secure the location of the Illinois Industrial University in this county."

Oct. 5—Proposition of Champaign and Urbana was to purchase the building then standing, called "The Urbana and Champaign Institute Building," with the eight acres on which it stood at a cost of \$30,000.00, then use the other \$70,000.00 to buy more land and secure the location of the University over the other contestants—Bloomington, Jacksonville, and other towns had made offers. The Champaign papers said that they could thus give this building, 1,000 acres for a farm, 100 acres for a "garden-patch" and still have \$40,000.00 left.

The building was erected in 1861, supposedly at a cost of \$175,000.00, and was said to be "one of the largest and most substantial buildings in the State, second only to the Normal University." It stood at the north end of what is now Illinois Field, facing University Avenue. The Main part of structure was 125 feet front, forty feet in depth, and five stories high. From the center projected a wing forty-four by seventy feet, four stories high. It contained ninety dormitories, each ten by fifteen, "suitable rooms for principals, professors, etc." and "accommodations for 800 students."

Oct. 12—Returns of the election on the question of the bond issue show the vote to have been: For, 1,601; against, 1,035—majority for 566.

"Urbana and Champaign were unanimously in favor of the measure. A considerable opposition was manifested in some of the country towns, however." This opposition was due to the fact that the smaller towns regarded the whole thing as a scheme on the part of Urbana and Champaign to make the entire county pay for a school which would benefit these two communities only.

1867

Jan. 10—Mr. Tinchcr (Senator from the Seventh District) introduced into the Senate a bill for "an act to provide for the organization, endowment, and maintenance of the Illinois Industrial University." This bill provided, among other things, that the Institution should be located at Champaign. At the same date Senator Fuller (Twenty-third district) introduced a bill similar to Mr. Tinchcr's except that it provided for the location of the University by a commission to be appointed by the Governor. These two bills were read twice and ordered printed. Jan. 11—Both bills in the House were introduced, the Champaign bill being offered by Mr. Griggs from that district. The Senate at this time voted that the entire grant should be applied to one institution. Jan. 25—The Governor approved a bill giving any county, city, township, or incorporated town authority to levy taxes or voluntary subscriptions for the purpose of securing the location of the University.

Feb. 1—Mr. Tinchcr moved to amend the Fuller Bill by striking out the section providing for a committee to locate the college. This amendment was carried by a vote of fifteen to nine. Feb. 22—House Bill amended by adding to the offer contained (the Institute property) therein (as requirements for the location) 810 acres of land, \$50,000.00 worth of freight (appropriated by the Illinois Central), \$100,000.00 in Champaign County Bonds, and \$2,000.00 in fruit, shade and ornamental trees and shrubbery from Dunlap's nursery, making a total of \$450,000.00 estimated valuation of property. This bill as amended passed the House on the same day. Its provisions were that the institution should be located in Urbana. The trustees were to be appointed by the Governor, with approval of the Senate, five from each grand judicial division, and one from each congressional district. They were to serve for six years, without salary, the first appointment to draw lots, one-third to serve two, one-third four, and one-third six years. The trustees were to elect a Regent to serve two years, a Treasurer, and a Recording Secretary, and were to provide buildings, teachers, etc. Students were to be at least fifteen years old. Each county was entitled to a scholarship for descendants of soldiers and seamen. No degrees were to be conferred on graduates. The Regent, with the Governor, the Superintendent of Public Instruction and the President of the State Agricultural Society were to be *ex-officio* members of the Board. The instructors were "to teach in the most thorough manner such branches of learning as are related to Agriculture and the Mechanic Arts and Military Tactics, without excluding other scientific and classical studies." The college year was to extend through six autumn and winter months so the students could go home for the six spring and summer months or stay at the University and pursue optional studies "provided that no student shall at any time be allowed to remain in or about the University in idleness, or without full mental or industrial occupation." This Act passed the House by a vote of sixty-six to ten, the Senate by eighteen to seven, and was approved Feb. 28, 1867. The immediate result was a huge celebration in Champaign.

Mar. 8—Passage of Supplemental Bill, providing that on the failure of the county authorities to comply with the requirements of the Act by June 1, the trustees were to locate the University at some other town. Trustees were appointed by Governor Oglesby as follows:

Mar. 12—First meeting of the Board of Trustees held in Springfield. Nominations for the position of Regent being called for, the names of Hon. Daniel J. Pickney, of Ogle County, Dr. N. N. Wood, of Morgan County, Hon. J. L. Pickard, of Cook County, and Dr. John Milton Gregory, of Kalamazoo, Mich., were proposed. Dr. Gregory was elected, at a salary of \$3,000.00 a year. A committee of five, with the Regent as chairman, was selected to prepare a course of study and report to the Board. John W. Bunn, of Springfield, was elected Treasurer, and a finance committee to serve for one year was appointed. Willard C. Flagg, of Madison County, was elected Corresponding Secretary; O. B. Galusha, of Grundy County, Recording Secretary. The Board passed a resolution favoring the establishment of a Mechanical Department to be located at Chicago. Mar. 29—An election was held in Urbana and Champaign to decide whether the two cities should appropriate \$45,000.00 for the University, Champaign to give \$25,000.00, Urbana, \$20,000.00. The vote was as follows: Champaign:—For, 676; against, 4. Urbana:—For, 406; against, 0. Mar. 29—Dr. Gregory visited Champaign and Urbana for the first time.

Apr. 10—Vote authorizing Supervisors to issue the bonds for \$100,000.00 resulted as follows: For, 2,731; against, 867.

May 7—The second meeting of the Board of Trustees was held in the chapel of the "Urbana and Champaign Institute," twenty-two of the thirty-two trustees being present. Dr. Gregory accepted the appointment, his salary having been increased to \$4,000.00 a year. A committee on Buildings and Grounds was appointed, the land grants accepted, and the University permanently located at Urbana. Scrip was ordered sold. A seal was adopted. It was decided to open the institution on the first Monday of March, 1868. A resolution to admit both sexes was referred to the Executive Committee to be appointed by the Regent.

A committee on Courses of Instruction reported the following curriculum:

July 31—Dr. Gregory issued a circular, proposing that each County Agricultural society offer a prize of one hundred dollars to aid the best scholar from the public schools of the county who should attend the Industrial University.

Nov. 26—Board of Trustees purchased six and one-half city lots adjacent to the University for the price of \$1,850.00. The lots purchased lay along the west of what is now Illinois Field. The committee recommended the purchase of twenty-four others, between Romine and Mathews Avenues, east of Illinois Field, which could be secured for \$9,150.00. This recommendation was referred to the Finance Committee. The Board decided that all students should register in the Military Department. The school year was divided into three terms, running from September to June. Three men were elected, Head Farmer, Jonathan Periam, Professor William Baker, of Springfield, Ill., and Professor G. W. Atherton, of New York. March 11 was decided upon as the date for the formal opening of the University.

1868-69

Mar. 10—Willard F. Bliss elected Professor of Agriculture. Mar. 11—Inaugural Ceremonies and Formal Opening of the University. Hon. S. W. Moulton presided at the exercises. The music was under the direction of Geo. F. Root, of Chicago, the dedication hymn being written by Dr. Gregory. Letters from Governor Oglesby, Senator Yates, and General Logan were read. The principal address was delivered by the Honorable Newton Bateman, State Superintendent of Public Instruction. General Hurlburt introduced Dr. Gregory. The exercises were followed by a banquet in the dining Hall of the University. Mar.—Philomathean and Adelpic Literary societies organized. Tuition at the University was placed at \$5.00 per term, \$15.00 per year.

June—Close of the University for the year; seventy-seven students were enrolled during the first term. During the few days of closing exercises Professor J. A. Sewall, of Normal, delivered an address before the Literary Societies.

Aug. 5—The following appointments were announced: Prof. A. P. S. Steward of Harvard, to the chair of Chemistry, Captain S. W. Shattuck, of Norwich University to be Assistant Professor of Mathematics and Instructor in Military Tactics, and T. J. Burrill, of the Urbana Graded School, as Assistant professor Natural History. The latter had been engaged by the Regent in April. Aug. 12, the first catalogue of the University was issued, announcing the second year of instruction to begin on the fourteenth of September; the University opened with a total enrollment of eighty students.

Nov.—The Committee on Faculty of the Board of Trustees reported the employment of Professors Stewart, Shattuck and Burrill, also of Captain E. Snyder as Accountant and teacher of Bookkeeping and German. The Board took up for consideration a resolution of the City Council of Chicago, promising a donation of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars for the establishment in Chicago of a Polytechnical School. The members of the Board residing in the Third Grand Division and the First Congressional District were authorized to accept the offer on behalf of the Board. The following resolution was passed: "Resolved that we recognize it as a duty of the Board of Trustees to make this University pre-eminently a practical school of Agriculture and the Mechanic Arts, not excluding other scientific and classical studies." A resolution calling for the admission of women to the University was referred to the next meeting for action.

Dec. 19—Announcement of the "First Annual Course of Agricultural Lectures and Discussions." The course was to start on the twelfth of January and to continue for eight days. Publication of the "Recommended Courses of Study," for the use of entering students.

Mar., 1869—The annual report of the regent included a statement that the students had worked on the farm two hours a day in the Spring, and one

PREFACE.

Prof. Tyler's History of Amherst College was published in 1873. It was an accurate and exhaustive record of the life of the college, of its professors and teachers, its trustees and benefactors, during its first half century. But to give a complete view of the work accomplished and the influence exerted by the college, something more was needed. The history of the college is fittingly supplemented by the biographies of the graduates, and before the former work had left the printer's hands, the task of collecting material for the latter had begun.

The Biographical Record of the Alumni was authorized by the Trustees in 1872, and Prof. E. P. Crowell and Prof. W. L. Montague were appointed to take charge of the work. A division of the labor was made, Prof. Crowell taking the earlier half of the classes, through 1850, and Prof. Montague the later, through 1871. Although circulars were at once issued to obtain the desired information, the requisite facts have, in many cases, been obtained only after much search and repeated inquiries. Yet, as rapidly as the pressure of College duties made it practicable, the work has been carried forward to a conclusion.

From 1876 to 1879, the work of gathering information respecting the first twenty-nine classes was carried forward by Prof. Chickering, and after that time resumed and completed by Prof. Crowell. The final preparation for the press of the materials thus collected has been made by Mr. W. S. Biscoe. The record of the classes from 1851 to 1871 inclusive has been wholly prepared by Prof. W. L. Montague, who has also had the editorial supervision of the entire work.

The editors have endeavored to make the reports as brief as possible; all eulogies have been carefully avoided, and the simple facts of each life stated; and yet, notwithstanding their utmost efforts, the

volume has extended nearly a hundred pages beyond what was expected. The following general order has been adopted in giving the record of each graduate :

1. His personal history before graduation.
2. His professional life ; including both the study and practice of his profession, with the facts arranged as far as possible chronologically.
3. Official positions held, books or pamphlets written, and honorary degrees received. There has been a great difference in the fullness with which the facts of this section have been stated in the written reports received, and a corresponding difference will consequently be found in the printed record.
4. The death of deceased graduates ; marriage and number of children.
5. The present P. O. address of all living graduates.

From some of the living graduates, it has been impossible to obtain any answer to the various circulars sent, and their records are of necessity incomplete. Friends and relatives have supplied some of the facts, but the editors do not feel that they are responsible for any error or omission in such records. In other cases there are seeming errors in the spelling of names, but it has been thought best to follow closely the responses which have been received. For the same reason there are frequent diversities in the way in which similar facts are given in different places, as well as in the fullness of individual records.

The graduates of Amherst College during its first half century have been engaged in the different professions and occupations as follows : 887 have been clergymen ; 92, foreign missionaries ; 181, physicians ; 305, lawyers ; 348, teachers ; 233, authors ; 138, professors ; 26, college presidents ; 83, editors ; 178 have engaged in business ; 41 have been merchants ; 32, manufacturers ; 76, farmers ; 21, civil engineers ; 2, U. S. ministers ; 2, U. S. Commissioners ; 10, members of Congress ; 28, State Senators ; 81, members of State Legislatures ; 2, governors ; 41, judges ; 207, in the U. S. Army ; 9, in the Confederate Army ; 1 has been Postmaster-General ; and 1, a Bishop ; the whole number has been 1968.

Every one, who notices an error or omission in the Record, will confer a favor upon the College by sending the correction to the College Librarian.

INTRODUCTION.

In the Preface to the History of Amherst College, which was published in 1873, it was announced that at my instance and the request of the Faculty Professors Crowell and Montague had commenced the collection of materials for a History of the Graduates of the College, which would be given to the public as soon as it could be prepared. After the lapse of ten years that promise is now fulfilled, though not without some change of plan and of hands in the execution of the work, which will be explained in the Preface. Meanwhile Professor Montague has prepared and printed, with great labor and painstaking, a Record of the Non-Graduate Members of Amherst College from 1821 to 1871. These three works, the *History of the College*, the *Record* of its *Alumni*, and the *Record* of its *Non-Graduates*, together with the *Exercises at the Semi-Centennial*, and *Student Life at Amherst*, all clustering about the Semi-Centennial, make up a pretty complete picture, or series of pictures, of Amherst College during the first half century of its existence.

If any of the readers of this Record wonder why a period as long as that of the Trojan War should have elapsed before its completion, let them undertake for themselves the compilation of such a mass of biography and history—nearly two thousand lives, over three thousand including the Non-Graduates; or let them read in the Preface to the *Record of Non-Graduates* Professor Montague's account of the process of collecting materials, the sources from which they have been gathered, the procrastinations and delays even of those who have been willing to communicate the facts, and the various means, instruments of torture shall I say, (surely it must have been torture to the authors, if not to the subjects of the history) by which information has been extorted from the reluctant and the indifferent. Then let them think of the more than hydrostatic pressure, to which

these hard, (or perhaps worse, soft), crude, incongruous and bulky materials must have been subjected in order to reduce them within the compass of a medium-sized volume! For myself I only wonder that the authors have lived through the process and been able to accomplish the work at all.

To me this Record has been as fascinating as it has been instructive. I was scarcely able to lay it aside till I had read it through, from beginning to end. Of course it is not to be expected that all, if indeed any, of the readers of this volume will feel the same interest in its perusal which I have felt, who have known as students the graduate and the non-graduate members of all but the first half a dozen classes, and have made the acquaintance of nearly all the members of those classes as they have revisited the College from time to time at Commencement. Yet I have learned much which I did not know about almost every person whose name appears; and I can hardly tell which have interested me the most, the old or the new facts, the old or the new acquaintances. In one or the other of these ways every alumnus will find matter of interest and instruction in every record.

In reviewing the history of classmates and college acquaintances, the thoughtful reader will probably meet with three kinds of surprises. He will be agreeably surprised, that some from whom he expected little, have done so much and done it so well. He will be sadly disappointed, that some who promised so much in College have accomplished so little after graduation, and some, alas! who did pretty well in college have made an utter shipwreck in the voyage of life. But most frequently of all he will be surprised to see that the great majority have been in after life so nearly and essentially what they were in College; though after all this is only the old law that the boy is father to the man, and whatsoever a man soweth that shall he also reap.

On the whole we shall doubtless feel that we have no occasion to be ashamed of our mother or her sons; on the contrary, the more we know of her and of them, the more we shall love and honor both. If they are her jewels, she is their pearl. The brotherhood of our College answers somewhat to the description which the Apostle Paul has given of the church in Corinth: Not *many* mighty, not many noble, not very many who sit in the high places of political power and preferment; but a great number of those whom God has called to run in his service, and to do the hard work that needs to be done

in the church and the world. We have our leaders in every sphere of public life, of whom we are justly proud. But the rank and file of our sacramental host, the fighting and the working men who are serving their country and mankind in the toil and battle of life, in business and the professions, in the pulpit and the press, in literature and science and education and religion—these are the strength and the glory of Amherst.

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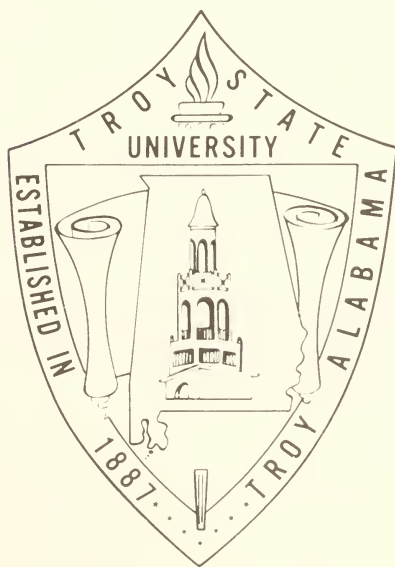
